Course Description

This course will cover chapters 21-40 of Wheelock's Latin, and it thus builds on material from Latin 1001. Thus, this class assumes mastery of the material from chapters 1-20. It strives for a basic understanding of Latin grammar, vocabulary, syntax, and translation. Students should expect at the end of the course to have an elementary understanding of Latin, to have a better understanding of English, and to be prepared to enter Latin 2001. Students will be graded according to a traditional scale (90-100=A, 80-89.9999999999999=B, etc).

Things That Should Not Have To Be Said At All

Come to class on time and do not leave class early. **Turn cellphones off.** Bring your books to class with you. Everything covered in class, including lectures, readings, translations, and homework is fair game for the exams. Course Requirements

1. **Attendance:** Attendance is mandatory, and students should come to class prepared to participate. If you are not in class when attendance is taken, you will be counted as absent. The instructor reserves the right to drop students who have excessive absences (more than 5) from the class with a final grade of "WF." Again, students who miss class are responsible for material assigned during that class and for collecting notes, etc. **Do not expect the instructor to provide you with copies of notes or handouts, and certainly do not expect private tutoring sessions after missing class.** If you miss class, it is **your** responsibility to collect copies of materials and copy notes. It is a good idea to get the phone numbers and e-mail addresses of several fellow students in case you have to miss class
2. **Midterm Exams:** There will be two midterm exams which will cover all material assigned as well as material presented in class. All exams are necessarily cumulative. Students should study vocabulary, grammar and practice translation. **40%**
3. **Quizzes:** Students should expect a 5-10 minute quiz at the beginning of class every day. Quizzes may cover vocabulary, translations, or grammar. Every Thursday, there will be a sight-translation quiz. **30%**
4. **Final exam:** The final exam will be cumulative, of course. **30%**

Basic Schedule*

Students should begin each chapter on their own by reading through the chapter and memorizing the vocabulary and grammar. Students should have attempted to work through all of the exercises (including Practice and Review sentences and Sententiae Antiquae) at the end of the chapter **BY THE FIRST DAY WE COVER THAT CHAPTER.** We will not have time to cover every exercise in class, but students are responsible for preparing all of them. Usually, the quiz on the initial day of a chapter will cover only vocabulary, but all subsequent quizzes will cover vocabulary, grammar, and translation. Students should have all of the exercises and translations finished **BY THE SECOND DAY WE COVER THAT CHAPTER,** including the corresponding

stories in *Groton and May*. There is a heavy work-load in this class, and we will be moving through the material quickly. Do not let yourself get behind.
