

Latin 1002: Elementary Latin II
Spring 2008

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Office Hours: 12:20-1:10 M, 2:00-3:15 TT, and by appointment

Objectives: This course is a continuation of LATN 1001 and introduces the student to classical Latin, including pronunciation, vocabulary, grammar and syntax, style, and techniques in reading and translation. While the most immediate objective is to learn to pronounce, read, comprehend, and translate Latin, other major goals include increased knowledge of Roman culture, enhanced understanding of English grammar, and increased English vocabulary.

Prerequisite: This class assumes a thorough knowledge of the material in Wheelock, chapters 1-20. If you have not taken LATN 1001 recently, you must review this material and see the Classics Department's free Latin tutors immediately.

Required Texts: Wheelock & LaFleur, *Wheelock's Latin*, 6th ed. revised
Groton & May, *38 Latin Stories*, 5th ed.

Tests and Final Examination: Students must complete six tests and the final exam in addition to chapter quizzes. Dates for all tests and the final exam are noted on the assignment sheet. There will be no make-ups on tests without a doctor's excuse (in the case of severe illness) or documentation of a family emergency (deaths, etc.). There will be no make-ups for the final exam or quizzes for any reason. Students with conflicting final exam schedules should see the instructor as soon as possible to make appropriate arrangements to reschedule as necessary.

Exemption of Final Exam: Students may exempt the final exam by meeting all of the following criteria: 1) "A" test average; 2) "A" on the last test; 3) "A" quiz average; 4) perfect attendance AND active daily participation following the last test.

Class Participation and Attendance: Regular attendance is required. Students are allowed four (4) absences for whatever reason, including illness, without penalty. For each additional absence, one (1) point will be deducted from the final course grade.

Introduction to the course

Usual schedule: we usually spend two to three days on each chapter.

3-Day Chapters: For the **first** day on each chapter, study Wheelock's discussion; memorize new paradigms, definitions, and vocabulary; and write into your notebook your translation of selected Practice and Review sentences (P&R, odd-numbered sentences, including English-to-Latin sentences, unless otherwise assigned). For the **second** day, review forms and vocabulary, and write out your translation of Sententiae Antiquae (SA, even) and/or reading passages from Groton & May (G&M). For the **third** day, review forms and vocabulary and write out your translation of assigned passages.

2-Day Chapters: For the **first** day, study Wheelock's discussion; memorize new paradigms, definitions, and vocabulary; and write into your notebook your translation of P&R (odd, including English-to-Latin). For the **second** day, review forms and vocabulary, and write out your translation of the assigned passages (SA and G&M).

Quizzes: First-day quizzes will concentrate on vocabulary; second- or third-day quizzes will focus on paradigms and/or content of passages.
